
Resources to Support Mental Health and Wellbeing



Free School Meals

If your child is currently eligible for Free School Meals, we are committed to help you to access this provision. A Free School Meal is a statutory benefit available to school children of families who receive other qualifying benefits. If your situation has changed recently and to see if your child is eligible to receive free school meals please click on this link: Plymouth City Council Free School Meals. During the closure of our school we have made provision to ensure those in our school community who are eligible to receive free school meals continue to do so and have accessed the Government's FSM Voucher Scheme. These vouchers are allocated per family, based upon the number of children in the family who are of school age, and do not include Universal Infant Free School Meals, which all Reception, Year 1 and 2 families are eligible for. We are providing these vouchers for a number of reasons, in addition to all children who are eligible to Free School Meals (not Universal Infant Free School Meals), we have also provided vouchers to children who have had recent Social Care involvement, those who were previously eligible for Free School Meals, families who receive food hampers and have had a Foodbank voucher. If you need additional support as your circumstances have recently changed then please contact us and we will try our best to help you in any way that we can!

Critical Workers

If you are a critical worker then please do confirm the provision needed by 10:00am each Thursday (if you have not already confirmed a regular weekly booking). You can do so by emailing:

primary@marineacademy.org.uk

This provision is strictly for critical workers who have no other adult at home to look after children and who are immediately required in the response to this virus.

If we have not already confirmed that you are a critical worker then when emailing, please attach a photo of your work ID page. We will endeavour to provide spaces for all children but please do understand that we need to ensure numbers are not too high to enable social distancing. If the number of requests exceeds our limit, we will have to prioritise the children and families who are offered the places, with certain job roles taking priority.

We would also like to reiterate our huge thank you to all of our parents who are critical workers that are doing the jobs that they do to help our country fight against this international pandemic.

Year 4 have started their new topic of Vikings. They have begun to learn about the different Gods and how many Gods the Vikings actually believed in. In Maths, Year 4 will be looking at decimals and in particular they will be finding out what happens when you divide a number by 10 or 100. Year 6 Learning - Twentieth Century Conflict

Well done Year 6 for all of your brilliant learning so far. I hope you have enjoyed watching the videos of 'Oranges in No Man's Land' as much as I (Miss Brunning) enjoyed recording them for you! I can see on the views that lots of you have been using these to help support your learning and these will continue throughout the term! You have been able to use the protractors sent home to you to help your learning around angles and in English you have been looking at how humans impact the Earth. Year 5 Learning – Middle East

Year 5 have been completing lots of excellent learning at home and it has been wonderful to see many examples of this. Mr Druce and Miss McNicholas are endeavouring to provide engaging learning experiences across the curriculum that the children would have covered in school. In English, they have developed their understanding of figurative language and empathised with characters through a Faraway Fiction book called 'Cloud Tea Monkeys'. Year 5 have enhanced their understanding of decimals by ordering and comparing them, rounding them to various degrees of accuracy and linking them to their fraction and percentage equivalences. The children have started their History learning about the Middle East and have enjoyed a range of learning in other curriculum areas, including Andy Goldsworthy style Art using natural resources and PE via Fitter Future and Joe Wicks' workouts. The Year 5 team are missing the children and hope to see you all in the near future.

Reception Learning – Splendid Safari

Although not in school, Miss Rowe and Mr Ferry have been very impressed with the super home learning taking place! They have loved receiving pictures and hearing about all the wonderful activities that the Reception children have completed. Reception's topic this term is 'Splendid Safari' where we hope the children have enjoyed listening to a story linked to this theme every week. The children have begun to identify the differences between where we live and an amazing country called Ghana! The children have even created their own Ghanaian flag using different materials. At home,

the children have also been very active, creating repeating patterns using different movements, as well as using their toys at home to create a pattern. Reading and listening to stories is still a very important part of learning, so all the staff hope the children are enjoying listening to stories that are read by their teachers online! Netflix has seen subscriber numbers surge this year, as lockdowns around the world keep people at home where they want to be entertained. Almost 16 million people created accounts in the first three months of this year, which is almost double the new sign-ups it saw in the final months of 2019. There are ways to ensure that your profiles are secure for your children to use below.



If you want to restrict access to a specific profile on your account, you can protect it with a Profile Lock PIN. To add a PIN to a profile you need to:

- 1. From a web browser, go to your Account page.
- 2. Open the Profile & Parental Controls settings for the profile you want to lock.
- 3. Change the Profile Lock setting.
- 4. Enter your Netflix account password.
- 5. Check the box to Require a PIN to access the selected profile.
 - a. To remove the PIN requirement, uncheck the box.



- 6. Enter four numbers to create your Profile Lock PIN. Unless you're using an unsupported device, you will enter this PIN to enter the profile or play titles downloaded from it.
- 7. If you want to require a PIN any time a new profile is added to your account, select Require PIN to add new profiles.
- 8. Select Submit.





Nintendo Switch Hack – Nintendo have confirmed a data breach, which means that over 160, 000 accounts have had their details stolen, some of these accounts have already been used to make illegal purchases. Nintendo have stated they will contact affected users and their advice is to do the following:

- 1. Log in to your Switch account and change the password, remember to use a good, strong password.
- 2. Enable 2-factor authentication. This means if somebody tries to use your login details, you will get a code sent to your phone, so you know that somebody is trying to log in.
- 3. Go to the HaveIBeenPwned website (https://haveibeenpwned.com/) and put in your username/email address to see if any accounts have been hacked.




