The children have concluded their Geography based topic 'Local Fieldwork' and as a result, they produced brilliant essays, which really highlighted their knowledge and understanding of the topic. Year 6 have all designed and made their own wooden toy with moving parts, as part of their Design and Technology learning. They had the opportunity to use hacksaws to cut out parts for their wooden toys, after accurately measuring. We are really looking forward to all of the fabulous lessons we have planned for the New Year. The whole Year 6 team wishes you a wonderful and magical Christmas!

Reception - Reception had a super Space Day this term. The children took part in Science experiments, made alien crispy cakes and watched a Space film. The children have been creating galaxies as part of their Art learning using chalks, as well as designing handprint aliens. During Maths, the children have enjoyed collecting data and finding out information, as well as solving problems, which involve sharing and halving. Daily, the children's confidence is increasing when it comes to reading and writing. It is wonderful to see the children choosing to write and wanting to impress their teachers. Well done to all the Reception children on their dedication and enthusiasm when learning the Nativity songs and lines; we hope you enjoyed the recording. They really are superstars!

Year 4 – Term 2 is always an exciting and busy one but Year 4 managed to continue to produce an array of amazing learning! From making a clay aarti in RE, creating their own moving mechanism in Design Technology and learning about endangered animals in English, Year 4 have worked so hard! We have all loved having Ms Bell teach us Spanish this term (adults included) and it has been great to see the children's confidence develop, to be able to speak Spanish outside of their lessons. Big well done to those children who have been awarded with the Spanish bags this term, we are excited to see who will get it in Term 3! Since the beginning of the year, we have had the opportunity to learn how to play Samba. This has been a fantastic opportunity and we thank Mr Glynn for all of his hard work. In addition to producing amazing learning, we got into the Christmas spirit when making our class and school Christmas videos, we hope you love them as much as we enjoyed making them! We hope you all have a safe and wonderful Christmas and we look forward to welcoming you to Term 3 on Tuesday 4th January 2022.

Pre-School – What a busy time it has been for the children in Pre-School. They have created amazing Christmas cards, practised lots of songs, which we hope you enjoyed watching us sing in our videos, and finished their topic learning all about 'Awesome Autumn'. The children had a superb WOW moment, where they learnt all about their new topic, which will be 'We're Going on a Bear Hunt' in the new year. Pre-School children and staff are looking forward to welcoming their new friends in January. We wish Mrs Brenton all the best with her new class in Reception and we welcome Miss Sanders to Puffin Class. We hope you have a lovely Christmas, and we look forward to seeing you in the new year.

Year 3 – What an excellent month Year 3 have had, working incredibly hard throughout all subjects. The children have immersed themselves in their Geography unit 'Villages, Towns and Cities' with visits to St Budeaux and Calstock. The children had the experience to practise using fieldwork study skills to collect and compare data from two different settlements. Their experiences of travelling by train and collecting data is so valuable as the children progress through the years and have further opportunities in future Geography topics. In addition, Year 3 visited White River Cinema in St. Austell and The Box Museum, Plymouth as part of their retrieval practice from last term's History topic, 'Prehistoric Britain'. The children were able to recall and retrieve lots of facts from their History lessons in school and made clear links to the activities provided by the museum. In school, Year 3 have had lots of discussions in RE and SMSC lessons about the importance of celebrating differences and other cultures. The children have shared excellent ideas about what 'family' means to them and how they like to spend their time together with their family. With Christmas fast approaching, the children have discussed the meaning of Christmas and the many family traditions at Christmas time. Everybody in Year 3 is excited to continue the fantastic learning in 2022! Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

Year 5 – Year 5 have had a fun and productive term resulting in some fabulous discussions and learning! In English, the children have studied the book 'Secrets of Stonehenge', an information text, which helped them practice writing high level sentence structures, which included parenthesis and relative clauses. For their independent final written piece of work, they were able to combine the skills they have been enhancing with their knowledge of 'Slums' to create their own information article. In their Geography topic 'Slums', Year 5 have learnt how, why and where slums form, then have deepened their knowledge by assessing what the problems associated with slums are and how they may be resolved. In Design Technology, they also applied their knowledge of slums, looking at the problems with sanitation in particular, leading them to research, design, build, test and evaluate their own water filters. Science has once again been a fun topic this term, where Year 5 examined materials and their properties, testing their durability, practical application, dissolving propensities and reversible/irreversible capacities. In Maths, the children have been analysing statistics presented in a variety of forms and succeeded in multiplying and dividing by 10, 100 and 1000. What a constructive and enjoyable term. The Year 5 team would like to thank the children for their resilience and persistence and wish them and their families a well-deserved, happy and restful Christmas!



<u>Nursery</u> – This term in Turtle Class, we have had a great time continuing to learn our Nursery Rhyme 'Hey Diddle Diddle'. The children have created some fantastic moons using bubble wrap and paint and have also been focusing on retelling the Nursery Rhyme using some character props. They have also been busy creating some lovely artwork for their Christmas cards and calendars. The children have worked really hard to learn their Christmas songs this term. Super learning Turtles!

Year 2 – This term the Year 2 children have been exploring their Geography topic of 'What a Wonderful World'. The children have just finished writing their essays, where they have been examining climates in different continents. We have been impressed by the knowledge the children have retained, and our Super Choices and Headteacher's Prize lists have been jammed pack with names across the year group. The children have been so resilient when writing at length, making us so incredibly proud. In Science, the children have been looking at 'Mini Worlds' where they have been observing animal environments closely. This has included identifying and classify living organisms or objects that have never been alive. In Design Technology, the children have been designing and creating moveable Christmas cards and Christmas decorations, which have been displayed on our whole school Christmas tree. Year 2 were really excited to take these home on the last day of term to add to your own trees with pride. Thank you so much for your continuous support throughout this term. The minimum age to have an Instagram account is 13. Instagram require everyone to be at least 13 to use Instagram and have asked new users to provide their age when they sign up for an account. While many people are honest about their age, they know that young people are not always truthful about their date of birth. Instagram want to do more to stop this from happening, but verifying a person's age online is complex and something many in the social media industry are grappling with. To address this challenge, they are developing new artificial intelligence and machine learning technology to help keep teens safer and apply new age-appropriate features.

Privacy is important on Instagram. There are a number of tools you can share with your teen that will give them more control over their digital identity and footprint. One of the first things you want to talk about is whether their account is going to be public or private. We recommend that teens make their account private, which is why anyone under 18 who signs up to Instagram will have the option to choose between a public or private account, with private selected by default. Understanding that they have control over who sees and interacts with the things they post online will empower teens to be themselves on Instagram, while helping them to stay safe online. Instagram want to strike the right balance of giving over 13s all the things they love about Instagram, while also keeping them safe. They do not want young people to be contacted by adults they do not know or do not want to hear from, and we believe having a private account is the best way to prevent that from happening.

Please remember though that you do need to be a teen to have Instagram, as the minimum age is 13 years old.



Safeguarding people where it matters

In danger? With a simple shake or tap it activates Hollie Guard, immediately notifying your chosen contacts, pinpointing your location and sending audio and video evidence directly to their mobile phones.

What is Hollie Guard

Hollie Guard is a next generation smartphone app that provides enhanced levels of protection.



Constant Con Deterrent mode Ste

The idea of Deterrent mode is to make it clear to anyone in your surrounding area that an alert has been raised and to reduce the risk of an attack. The phone will display an obvious red alert screen capturing your GPS location, as well as audio/video footage that may be used to assess danger and collate evidence.

With a second shake of the phone it will generate a high-pitched alarm and a flashing light to attract help.



Deterrent mode

Stealth mode

Alternately, Stealth Mode allows you to raise an alert silently while displaying a default home screen that would look inconspicuous to the attacker, thereby giving the impression that no alarm has been triagered.

This feature is useful in certain situations in which raising an alert could increase the risk of harm if the assailant becomes aware that an alert has been triggered.




<u>Christmas Holiday Game Ideas</u>

How to be Dementia-Friendly this Festive Season

Whether planning activities and celebrations at home or looking for ways to help when out and about – we love to encourage dementia-friendly behaviour all year round (of course!). But, given the festive season is fast approaching, we've put together some helpful hints and tips tailored for this time of year, meaning everyone can be as comfortable as possible.

Celebrations at home

Create a quiet space

It's always a good idea to make sure there is somewhere for people to take breaks if feeling overwhelmed by celebrations. A quiet room that's easily accessible can be a great help. Be sure to check in with those who need additional support throughout the day, and let them know there is a quiet space available.

Food and drink

Common symptoms of dementia can make eating and drinking more challenging. Memory loss, difficulties identifying food and drink items, and sight loss can all make it more difficult to eat and drink well.

It's helpful to consider preferences and what is likely to appeal most to your guests. Easy to hold portions such as finger foods are a good idea, and non-verbal communication such as holding up a mug when offering a cup of tea can also be helpful.

Decorations and layout

Think about decorations and layout in your home. Although festive decorations can be great in prompting reminiscence and conversation, try not to make things look too different and potentially disorientating. Ensure toilets are easily accessible and use signs if possible.

Cosy activities

Stay warm and plan some inclusive activities to do at home. Why not prepare a memory box as a festive gift. You could use items from around the home - photos, CD's, recipes or pieces of jewellery - anything that sparks conversation and happy memories!

Or, plan a day of reminiscing. You could cook a loved one's favourite childhood recipe or sweet treat, make a playlist, and watch old films.

Out and about

Lend a helping hand

Do you know a neighbour who might need a helping hand, or who can't venture out in the cold weather? If you're making a trip to the local shop or post office why not ask if they need anything. Something as simple as picking up stamps, or taking letters to the post box can help someone stay connected to friends and family.

Volunteer your time

Keep an eye out for local events or organisations who might need assistance this time of year. Reach out to local care homes to ask if they need help writing Christmas cards to residents, or volunteer as a marshal or helper at a local event.

Show your understanding

Something as simple as acknowledging that some people may need longer to pay at tills, might become disorientated in shops and might become overwhelmed in public places can go a long way to helping someone feel safer when out and about.

Having patience and understanding and identifying situations where you can help can work wonders.




We are very excited to be Highly Commended in the Creativity and Innovation category of the Renaissance Awards 2021!

Early years choking hazards food safety advice

For babies and young children, food can be a choking hazard, especially when they do not chew their food well or they try to swallow it whole.

Choking can happen with any foods, but 'firm foods', bones and small round foods that can easily get stuck in the throat present a higher risk. Therefore, care givers should follow these five essential steps:




Make sure food is **suitably prepared and served** for babies and children under 5 years old. For suitable foods, see <u>https://www.nhs.uk/start4life/weaning/</u> Introduce babies to solid foods from around 6 months of age.

Think about size, shape and texture of food. Cut food into narrow batons, avoid round shapes and firm foods. Firm fruit & vegetables can be softened by cooking.



Ensure that babies and young children are alert and seated safely upright in a highchair or appropriately sized low chair whilst eating.

Babies and young children should be supervised at all times while eating. You will be able to identify the early signs of choking and prevent harm.

Early years food choking hazards



Below is a table of advice on key foods for care givers who are involved with preparing and serving food for babies and young children (under 5 years old)

Vegetable and fruits	Advice	
Pips or stones in fruit	Always check beforehand and remove hard pips or stones from fruit.	
Small fruits	Cut small round fruits like grapes, cherries, berries, strawberries and cherry tomatoes, into small pieces: cut lengthways and then again cut them in halves (quarters).	
Large fruits and firm fruits	Cut large fruits like melon and firm fruits like apple into slices instead of small chunks. For very young children, consider grating or mashing firm fruits, or softening them up by steaming or simmering.	
Vegetables	Cut vegetables like carrots, cucumber and celery into narrow batons. For very young children consider grating or mashing firm vegetables and legumes like butter beans, chickpeas and tofu, or softening them up by steaming or simmering.	
Skin on fruit and vegetables	Consider removing the skin from fruit and vegetables, especially for very young children. Peeled fruit and vegetables can be swallowed more easily.	
Cooking fruit and vegetables	Consider softening firm fruit and vegetables (such as carrots, broccoli, yam and apples) by steaming or simmering until soft. Serve cut into slices or narrow batons.	
Meat and fish	Advice	
Sausages and hot dogs	Cut sausages and hot dogs into short strips. Cut them in half and then lengthways or as thinly as possible. Peeling the skin off the sausages helps them to be swallowed more easily.	
Meat or fish	Remove bones from meat or fish. Cut meat into strips as thinly as possible. Remove skin and fat from meat and fish, it will help the food pass smoothly down the throat.	
Cheese	Advice	
Grate or cut cheese	Grate or cut cheese into short strips. Cut lumps of cheese as narrow as possible.	
Nuts and seeds	Advice	
Chop or flake whole nuts	Chop or flake whole nuts, peanuts and seeds. Whole nuts should not be given to children under five years old.	
Bread	Advice	
White bread and other breads		
write bread and other breads	White bread can form a ball shape with a dough-like texture at the back of a child's throat, if not chewed properly. Brown bread or toasted white bread are good alternatives. Cut bread, chapatis, naan bread and other breads into narrow strips.
