Year 6 – Year 6 have had a fabulous term and February has been filled with awesome learning. We completed our History based topic, 'Civil Rights' and as a result, informative and fabulous essays were written, where the children created a balanced argument, explaining the important of civil disobedience and legal changes in the 1950's. Our English learning came to an end with a workshop with Josephine's Stories. The children were taught how to create their own stories using words and props given. They then did a fabulous job of acting their stories out to the rest of the group! It's been a great term and we look forward to the wonderful Geography topic, 'Population' next term, amongst all the other amazing lessons that will take place. Have a great half term break!

**<u>Reception</u>** – Reception have had a fantastic term learning all about pirates in their topic 'Shiver M'Timbers!' The children were superstars on their trip to Mount Edgcumbe, sailing the seven seas on board their ship. The children went on a treasure hunt and enjoyed exploring the beach. This term we have been super impressed with the children's reading progress. They are learning to read longer words as well as writing captions. The children have learnt all about floating and sinking and have even had an opportunity to make pirate pizzas. It has been brilliant to see the children become so independent with their learning and wanting to impress adults. We cannot wait for next term!

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Year 4 - What an amazing term Year 4 have had! In English, the children have enjoyed innovating a traditional tale. To promote creativity in their writing, Year 4 were lucky enough to visit Plymouth's capital and participate in a creative writing workshop with some talented writers. We had a fantastic day, and the children were so well behaved that members of the public stopped to complement their impeccable behaviour. The children have particularly enjoyed their Science topic this term 'States of Matter'. This has been a great opportunity for the children to fully immerse themselves in a range of experiments. In Maths, the children have been challenged with their multiplication and division unit but the Year 4 team have been blown away with their perseverance. The children were thrilled to master a new technique in Art, where they were able to tie dye. This term concluded with completing the Anglo-Saxon essays and it has been a pleasure to read such amazingly constructed essays. The children have not only been able to recall amazing facts but they have used their oracy skills to produce beautifully written essay. Well done everyone!

<u>Nursery</u> – This term The Nursery children have continued their theme of 'Little Bo Peep' and have been amazing at learning the Nursery Rhyme.



The children have also been practising their colours through songs and matching games and they have really impressed us, hopefully lots of you will be able to see this in their learning journeys online. We hope you all have a lovely half term and look forward to seeing you all, ready to start our new topic 'Humpty Dumpty'.

Pre-School – In Pre-School we have continued to enjoy activities from our topic 'We're Going on a Bear Hunt', such as painting with mud, making paper plate bears, and talking about where the bear is using positional language. The children have loved this topic and can retell the story with great expression and Makaton. We have continued to enjoy Maths using the Numberblocks, and explored different sounds in Phonics. Penguins and Puffins loved dressing up to 'Express Ourselves' for Children's Mental Health Week, there were lots of different cool outfits. After Half Term, the children are excited to learn all about their new topic 'Helpful Heroes', role-play with their friends in our very own 'Hospital' and learn our Topic book 'Emergency' by Margret Mayo. We hope you have a lovely Half Term and thank you for all your support.

Year 3 – This term, Year 3 have been very busy! They have learnt all about The Shang Dynasty and had a special visitor come into school to teach them all about life during The Shang Dynasty. The children have learnt so much and have written some in-depth factual History essays! They have also been lucky enough to have a Music Teacher teach them Samba every Friday and they have explored a range of different musical instruments. They have written and performed some great poetry in English with help from the poet Simon Mole.

Year 5 – This month, Year 5 have continued to show resilience and persistence in their learning, completing new personal bests and rising to the challenges expected of them. In their History topic Medieval Monarchs, they learnt about the most influential monarchs of the Medieval period and showed off their super learning in their end of topic piece of writing; a timeline showing all the 'great' and 'terrible' actions of each monarch. Their timelines were factual and creative and the opinions they expressed were insightful and considered. In Maths, the children have extended their multiplication and division knowledge, working extremely hard to grasp new concepts and strategies. In English, they have studied the plays of Shakespeare and written their own play-scripts for the Battle of Hastings, which they had learnt about in their History topic. They also studied the poems of many significant poets, including Edward Lear and Michael Rosen, using these as inspiration to create their own poetry. In Computing, the children have enjoyed planning and building their own computer games. They enjoyed this so much that they have continued to work on them in their free time on the Chromebooks! In Science, Year 5 have learnt about the lifecycles of different animals and plants, explaining they have produced this month and we look forward to them building on this knowledge in their upcoming topics!

Year 2 – The Year 2 children loved their History topic in Term 3 which concluded with an incredible 'Great Fire of London' experience on the last day of term. The children created their own mini pudding lane, 'burnt it down' and even blew it up! We had to be very quiet when making gunpowder, so we didn't get on a warning for destroying the school! During their Maths learning this term, the children started their Statistic unit, practicing making tally charts and pictograms. In Phonics, the children have shown incredible blending skills and are able to quickly chunk longer words so they can build on their reading fluency. During English, the children have focused on expanded noun phrases and are able to use exciting adjectives. We have even used conjunction and subordinate conjunctions-wow Year 2! We are really looking forward to the next term and can't wait to start our new Geography topic 'Let's go to China'. We can't wait to hear about your Chinese research and see your flags so we can decorate the classroom.

Year 1 – Year 1 have had a fantastic term. In Maths the children have been focusing on adding and subtracting using the resources to help them. We will look to continue this learning after half-term. In English, the children have been writing their own set of instructions focusing on the importance of ordinal phrases. The children have been thoroughly enjoying their phonics and reading practice sessions. We have seen such an improvement in their expression, decoding and comprehension skills. They are all superstars! We have enjoyed learning all about the Ancient Egyptians in History. Learning how the River Nile was important, how Ancient Egyptians lived in comparison to us today and all about the most famous Pharaoh in Egypt. All children produced some wonderful essays to show off their new knowledge. Well done Year 1!

### Upper Key Stage Two Residential to London

We were very excited for 54 of our Year 5 and 6 children to go on their Residential to London at the end of Term 3. The children visited the Tower of London, took part in the London Bridge Experience, went on the London Eye and the River Thames cruise as well as watching The Lion King at the Theatre and eating at London's Hard Rock Café. The children were excellent role models throughout the trip and engaged brilliantly with all of the wonderful opportunities and activities on offer to them.



In July, there is another opportunity for the Year 5 and 6 children to stay away from home by this time going to Forest and Beach in Beesands.

#### Swiggle – Child-Friendly Search Engine

Swiggle.org.uk is a friendly search engine aimed at children in Key Stage 2. It has been designed and developed by South-west Grid for Learning, a charity dedicated to empowering the safe and secure use of technology.

Swiggle.org.uk gives children a great start in encouraging responsible online searching. The internet is a vast resource, and some content is not appropriate for children, SWGfL recommends adding Swiggle to your browser or put the Screen Cover link on your bookmark bar. Swiggle is powered by Google Custom Search, the results are filtered using Google SafeSearch, and SWGfL has configured the results to prioritise educational resources.

Swiggle also filters the search terms to check that it is not being used to search for inappropriate content. Consider encouraging your children to use Swiggle, when on devices at home, as an alternative for Google and other search engines.



## Reading aloud to children: 7 steps to making it magical



There is no blueprint for reading aloud, but these simple steps from Professor Teresa Cremin will help you relax and enjoy the special time that is sharing a book with your child. She says: "Reading aloud not only nurtures children's pleasure in reading, it offers them models of how a book should sound and feel, helping them develop expressive reading in their own heads. Reading aloud to young children prompts them to listen actively and process more challenging texts and vocabulary than they could possibly achieve on their own".

So settle down with your child, find a great book and take your time exploring it together. Here's seven steps you can take to make reading aloud a really valuable experience:

### 1. Find a brilliant book

Quality picture books lend themselves to reading aloud to young children. They often have rich rhythms and rhymes, stunning illustrations and engaging characters with whom we can all connect. It's worth the hunt – at school, the library or local bookshop and involving your child in choosing too. If there's time try and read it to yourself first so you know how it flows.

Some of my favourites to read aloud to young children are:

- We're Going on a Bear Hunt, by Michael Rosen and Helen Oxenbury
- Oi Dog! by Kes and Claire Gray
- There's a Bear on my Chair, by Ross Collins
- Dogger, by Shirley Hughes
- Can't you Sleep Little Bear, by Martin Waddell

### 2. Choose a comfy spot

Turn off the TV and your phone and settle down together, perhaps with your child's favourite cuddly toy to listen in too! It is often said readers are raised on their parents' laps, so get comfortable and hold the book so you can both see it. This is your special time together.

### 3. Begin the journey

Read the title aloud and the author's name and spend some time just looking together at the cover together, you might point things out, wonder aloud what's going to happen to a particular

character but let your child comment too. If you wish read the back cover blurb too, tempting your child with the snippets offered and chatting about what the book appears to be about.

### 4. Read, relax and respond

Open it up unhurriedly and begin to read the first few pages of the text, reading slowly and expressively before you pause, so you've begun to tempt your child in to the tale. Relax; there is no right way to do this! Being responsive to your child's reactions is important. If they comment, ask questions or are looking closely at a picture, pause and respond, their relaxed attentive involvement is a joy to see and deserves your encouragement.

### 5. Blether about the book

Informal book blether is key to enjoying a story. Pause between reading it aloud and take the time to chat about what's happening, the behaviour of the characters, what might happen next and so on. Make connections to people and events in your child's life as this will help them make personal sense of the story.

Far from being a one-sided experience, reading aloud should be interactive – packed with young children's observations, responses to the text and significant book blether.

#### 6. Bring the book to life

Don't rush, but do keep the flow of the story going (there will be plenty of time to examine it further on a 2nd/3rd reading!), so whilst at times you'll stop to chat, at others, hold the telling space and have fun! Add in noises, emphasis, intonation and colour by using your voice to bring the book to life. No-one is watching and your child will enjoy it more and join in with your actions, facial expressions and any repeating lines.

### 7. Finish with space to think

As you reach the last page, slow down and let the story reach its end with emphasis. Then pause, looking intently at the page yourself to think about the tale, don't rush to asking questions, allow some thinking space and let your child guide you. They may choose to look back through it, may demand it 'again!' or may scramble down in search of another. There's no need to discuss it, but if they're looking through it they may want to talk more about it.
