
#### Our Courageous Choir!

# Mac and veg slices recipe

Like a thick omelette made with pasta and vegetables, this can be served hot, warm or cold for a tasty light meal.

Prep: 10 mins Cook: 30 mins Serves 4







# Ingredients

- 100g macaroni
- 1 teaspoon vegetable oil
- 1 pepper, any colour, deseeded and chopped
- 1 small courgette, grated
- 100g frozen peas (or sweetcorn)
- 4 eggs
- 2 tablespoons semiskimmed or 1%-fat milk
- 50g grated reduced-fat cheddar
- 2 teaspoons dried mixed herbs
- 1 pinch ground black pepper
- salad, to serve

### Method

1. Cook the macaroni in boiling water for 10 to 12 minutes, until just tender. Rinse with cold water to cool it quickly, then drain thoroughly.

You could use cooked potatoes instead of pasta. You will need about 225g, chopped into chunks.

2. Heat the vegetable oil in a non-stick frying pan and stir-fry the pepper for 3 to 4 minutes. Remove from the heat and add the courgette and frozen peas or sweetcorn. Add the macaroni and mix well.

3. Beat the eggs and milk together, then stir in the reduced-fat cheese and dried herbs. Season with black pepper. Pour into the frying pan and cook over a low heat for 4 to 5 minutes, without stirring, to set the base. Meanwhile, preheat the grill to mediumhigh.

4. Put the frying pan under the grill and cook for 4 to 5 minutes until the surface has set and is golden brown. Serve hot, warm, or cold, cut into wedges – with some salad on the side.

# Plymouth Young Carers

You're a young carer if you're under 18 and help to look after a relative with a disability, illness, mental health condition, or drug or alcohol problem.

If you're a young carer, you probably look after one of your parents or care for a brother or sister. You may do extra jobs in and around the home, such as cooking, cleaning or helping someone get dressed and move around. You may also give a lot of physical help to a brother or sister who's disabled or ill. Along with doing things to help your brother or sister, you may be giving them and your parents' emotional support, too.

If you believe your child is doing the above, please get in touch with us at school by either asking to speak to our Inclusion Team or by emailing the Primary email address primary@marineacademy.org.uk

You might not want school to know you child is caring for someone but if we don't know about your situation, it will be difficult for teachers to understand if your child struggles to keep up in class or doesn't do homework.

Alternatively, if you would like to request a Young Carer Assessment please email <u>time4u@plymouth.gov.uk</u> with 'Young Carers Assessment Request' in the subject field. Alternatively, you can call 07899950155 for an informal chat.

A trained person from Plymouth City Council or an organisation they work with, will chat about how caring affects things like:

- activities your child takes part in or wants to take part in
- their physical, mental and emotional health






Goodbye and Good Luck Year 6!

#### **Online Safety** ARE YOU As we approach the Summer Holiday, we recognise that your child may be spending ONLINE SAFETY an increased amount of time online. Therefore, we would like to share some advice to further support your child with e-safety. This month's focus is 'Snapchat' and how AWARE? you can support your child with having positive experiences of this platform if you provide permission for them to use this. Staying Safe Online TOP TIPS **Snapchat** Snapchat is a photo- and video-sharing app which also allows users to chat with friends via text or audio Users can share images and videos with specific friends, orthrough a 'story' (documenting the previous 24 hours) visible to their entire friend list. Snapchat usage rose during the pandemic, with many young people utilising it to connect with their peers. The app continues to develop features to engage an even larger audience and emulate current trends, rivalling platforms such as TikTok and Instagram. CONNECTING SEXTING WITH STRANGERS Sexting continues to be a risk associated with Snapchat. The app's 'disappearing messages' feature makes it easy for young people (teens in particular) to share explicit images on impulse. While these pictures do disappear – and the sender is notified if it has been screenshotted first has save images, such as faking Even if your child only connects on the app with people they know, they may still receive friend requests from strangers. Snapchat's links with apps such as Wink and Hoop have increased this possibility. Accepting a request means that children are then disclosing personal information through the Story, SnapMap and Spotlight features. This could allow predators to gain their trust for sinister purposes. 0 0 to save images, such as taking pictures with a separate device. DAMAGE TO CONFIDENCE Snapchat's filters and lenses are a popular way for users to enhance their 'selfie game'. Although many are designed to entertain or amuse, the beculty filters on photos can set unrealistic body image expectations and creats teelings of inadequacy. Comparing themselves unfovourably against other Snapchat users could threaten a child's confidence or sense of self-worth. **EXCESSIVE USE** There are many features that are attractive to users and keep them excited about the app. Snap streaks encourage users to send snaps daily. Spotlight Challenges give users to the chance to obtain money and online fame, and the Spotlight feature's scroll of videos makes it easy for children to spend hours watching content. 00 Add ME **VISIBLE LOCATION** My Places lets users check in and search for popular spots, parks or shopping centres – and recommend them to their friends. The potential issue with a young person consistently checking into locations on Snapchat is that it allows other users in their friends list (even people they have only ever met online) to see where they currently are and where they regularly go. INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT •• Some videos and posts on Snapchat are not suitable for children. The ore not suitable for children. The hashtags used to group content are determined by the poster, so an innocent search term could still yield age-inappropriate results. The app's Discover function lets users swipe through snippets of news stories and trending articles that often include adult content. There is currently no way to turn off this feature. #NOFILTER **Advice for Parents & Carers** CHOOSE GOOD CONNECTIONS TURN OFF QUICK ADD TALK ABOUT SEXTING Snapchat has recently announced that it is rolling out a new safety feature: users will receive notifications reminding them of the importance of maintaining connections with people they actually know well, as opposed to strangers. This 'Friend Check Up' encourages users to delete connections with users they rarely communicate with, to maintain their online safety and privacy. It may feel like an awkward conversation (and one that young people can be reluctant to have) but it is important to talk openly and non-judgementally about sexting. Discuss the legal implications of sending, receiving or sharing explicit images, as well as the possible emotional impact. Emphasise that your child should never leel pressured into sexting – and that if they receive unwanted explicit images, they should tell a trusted adult straight away. The Quick Add function helps people find each other on the app. This function works based on mutual friends or whether someone's number is in your child's contacts list. Explain to your child that this feature could potentially make their profile visible to strangers. We recommend that your child turns off Quick Add, which can be done in the settings (accessed via the cog icon). ÷ **KEEP ACCOUNTS PRIVATE** CHAT ABOUT CONTENT BE READY TO BLOCK AND REPORT

Talk to your child about what is and isn't wise to share on Snapchat (e.g. don't post explicit images or videos, or display identifiable details like their school uniform). Remind them that once something is online, the creator loses control over where it might end up – and who with. Additionally, Snapchat's 'Spotlight' feature has a #challenge like Tiktok's: it's vital that your child understands the potentially harmful consequences of taking part in these challenges. Profiles are private by default, but children may make them public to gain more followers. Your child can send Snaps directly to friends, but Stories change the settings. If they use SnapMaps, their location is visible unless 'Ghost Mode' is enabled (again via settings). It's prudent to emphasise the importance of not adding people they don't know in reallife. This is particularly important with the addition of My Places, which allows other Snapchatters to see the places your child regularly visits and checks in: strangers, bullies and groomers could use this information to engage in conversation and arrange to meet in person.

If a stranger does connect with your child on Snapchat and begins to make them feel uncomfortable through bullying, pressure to send explicit images or by sending explicit images to them, your child can select the three dots on that person's profile and choose report or block. There are options to state why they are reporting that user (annoying or malicious messages, spam, or masquerading as someone else, for example).

#### New 'Meet Up' Feature

Snapchat's newest feature adds an extra layer to their existing Snap Map feature by allowing users to get directions to their friend's exact location. It shows how long it would take someone to walk, drive, or use public transport to reach the address. Essentially, anyone is able to gain access to someone's workplace, school, or home address and the fastest route to get there. 'Meet Up' is accessed by visiting a user's profile to look at their location on Snap Map (a feature that is on by default).

Congratulations to you all on starting, continuing and not giving up on, your instrumental learning this last year! We have had our highest number of children taking up an instrument ever and Mr. Clennel-White is proud of you all, as he knows how hard you've had to practice, and the noise you've had to make at home!
