Year 4 - During this term, we celebrated 'British Science Week', where we focused on 'Connections'. In line with this theme, the children explored where food came from, using food chains. We then discussed how we can increase the insect population and explored how Marine Academy Primary can support this. We even went on an insect bug hunt in our outdoor area! In Maths, the children have focused on fractions for this term. This has been a challenging topic but it has been a great opportunity for everyone to showcase their times table knowledge. In English, we have been reading 'A Walk in London' and the children have innovated this text to include historical places in Plymouth, which has been fantastic! To support our Geography fieldwork, we walked down to St Budeaux square, to interview members of the public, to ask them about internal migration. The children showed impeccable MAP Manners!

Year 6 - Year 6 have been working extremely well and it is lovely to see them growing in all areas. In Maths, we have been focusing on Statistics and Geometry. In particular, it has been great to see children mastering their skill of finding the mean of a set on numbers and being able to translate and reflect shapes. Reading has brought great conversation and debate to Year 6. The class book is 'The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas' and although we aren't at the end, the children have been predicting really well and showing maturity in being able to sympathise with some of the characters. Year 6 have also been taking SATs practice in their stride and have been inspirational in their attitude to pushing themselves further. Keep it up Year 6, you are amazing!

Year 3 – This month, the children in Year 3 have engaged brilliantly with their Geography topic "Mountains, Volcanoes and Earthquakes". Earlier this month, the children watched their volcanoes erupt using bicarbonate of soda and vinegar to replicate a life-like volcanic eruption. Furthermore, the children can explain how a volcano and an earthquake occurs and the short-term and long-term effects it can have on people's lives. In Maths, the children have shown fantastic learning to compare different lengths and measurements. The children solved real-life problems involving converting millimetres to centimetres and centimetres to metres. More recently, the children have thought about fractions by finding equivalent fractions of one half and one quarter. They have taken part in some great Science learning where they have explored the different parts of a plant and cut open fruit and vegetables to explore seeds when learning about seed dispersal! In English, they have enjoyed making their own characters for their own fictional stories and have become professionals at using similes! In Year 3 everyone has had lots of fun taking part in World Book Day and Red Nose Day. We loved seeing everyone's costumes and the children helped to raise a fantastic sum of money for charity.

Work Hard, Be Kind and Amazing Things will Happen!

Year 1 – The month of March was another exciting one in Year 1. The children enjoyed riding the Ocean City Tour Bus around Plymouth as part of the Geography topic, 'To Plymouth and Beyond!' The children took in all of the sights of the city and were able to talk about the key landmarks. The children were super roles models throughout the day and were a credit to the Academy. The month of March also saw the return of 'Comic Relief'. The children did a fantastic job raising lots of money and had fun along the way. They looked great in their red mufti and voted superbly in 'The Masked Singer: Teacher edition'. Mr Andrews is still on a high from winning! There have been many opportunities for great learning this month. The children have really impressed the adults in Year 1 with their Geographical vocabulary and are able to recognise different types of housing. In Maths, the children have been learning to count in 2s and 5s and have started to solve number problems relating to these. In English, the children learnt all about the Chinese New Year and then created their own information pages about Easter. The children became super Scientists during British Science Week! They expertly investigated what the number of insects in our outside area was. The children were able to use their observation skills to do so. It has been another fantastic term in Year 1. All the staff wish the children a restful Easter. We cannot wait to return for the Summer term where the children will be learning about the Ancient Olympics as part of the History topic, 'Significant Sports Stars'.

Year 5 – Year 5 have enjoyed a range of great experiences during March. A highlight has been their swimming lessons at the Life Centre and it has been absolutely wonderful to see the skills progression and resilience that they have demonstrated. Alongside this, the children have had an enjoyable visit to Bellever Forest to complete some Geography fieldwork and a lovely open-top bus tour through Plymouth to complement their English learning. In English, Year 5 have learnt about a range of letters and written their own persuasive versions about combating climate change. In Maths, they have been making excellent progress through their fractions topic, where they have been finding equivalent fractions, converting between improper and mixed formats, as well as adding and subtracting them. In Science, the children have enjoyed British Science Week and their learning about forces. It consisted of designing an experiment to investigate the effects of air resistance and using Newton meters to weigh a range of objects.

Year 2 – What a wonderful term Year 2 have had! The children have been continuing their exploration of China in Geography. They had made excellent links when comparing the Chinese city Kunming to Plymouth; in Maths, they have been learning about measure and in English they have been writing letters and stories using the wonderful book 'The Day the Crayons Quit'. As a treat for writing such amazing persuasive letters to Mrs Meredith, she graciously accepted our request for a trip to Dartmoor Zoo. Well done Year 2. Your letters must have been amazing to receive such a wonderful reward!

We were overwhelmed by your amazing responses to the Science Home Learning. We genuinely loved looking at all your posters, photos, and video clips. We just wanted to say we are so grateful for your engagement on the Boom Reader app. Your comments about your child's reading really supports the sessions we are doing in school.

<u>Pre-School</u> - The Pre-School have blown us away with all of the amazing learning they have been doing throughout our topic 'Dinosaur Detectives'. They have made their own dinosaur footprints using different coloured paint, been dinosaur detectives and found different dinosaurs in the outdoor learning area and even made their own class dinosaur eggs. It has been wonderful to see the amazing learning they have created and the great perseverance they have shown during their independent learning time challenges especially when making and decorating their own dinosaurs. We have enjoyed celebrating World Book Day and Red Nose Day and the children were amazing at their plank challenge! The children have blown us away with their Phonics learning and have applied this during their learning time at our Sound of the Week table. In Maths, the children have been adding one and counting backwards which they have done with such confidence it has been amazing to see! We are very excited to welcome new friends after Easter! We would like to wish all of our Pre-School children a Happy Easter and are looking forward to seeing you after the Easter Break and learning all about 'Are We There Yet?' our new transport topic!

Nursery - Turtle Class have had a very busy and enjoyable term. We continued learning our rhyme Humpty Dumpty and have been practicing the Makaton daily. During independent time we have been completing Humpty Dumpty puzzles, putting bandages on Humpty Dumpty and making Humpty Dumpty with paint and egg-shaped sponges. The children have continued to use our new sand tray and water tray well and have shared the resources beautifully. World book day was a very exciting day. The children loved dressing up and reading stories together with some Hot Chocolate. We also enjoyed exploring Red Nose day together and worked hard to make our own red noses with tissue paper. The children were also very proud of their Mother's Day cards. Turtle Class have also started having Music time on a Wednesday and the children have loved having a go with the boomwhackers. We are also enjoying Taekwondo with Gary and Spanish with Amy every week. We wish our children who are moving up to pre-school all the best and hope everyone enjoyed the Easter Holidays. Thank you for your support.

Reception – Reception have made such amazing progress this term and have shown super dedication to learning. During our topic 'Deep Sea Divers' the children have learnt facts, explored what it means to be a diver and shown care and understanding to look after our sea animals. The children have enjoyed taking on a role in our role-play aquarium, including being a diver or manager. They also thoroughly enjoyed their trip to The National Marine Aquarium and were impeccably behaved in a public space. The children have learnt all about 2D shapes this term, thinking about the differences and similarities, as well as identifying the properties of each shape. Thank you so much for reading with your child at home. It makes a real difference to their learning and confidence to read. We have loved observing the children reading to their friends during Independent learning Time, as well as writing independently! The children have taken part in many events around the school, including British Science Week and Red Nose day. Our highlight was most definitely our Mother's Day event. Thank you attending; it was lovely for our children to reflect and show an understanding for Mother's Day.

Banana and Apricot Bagels







Such a simple idea — yet these fruity bagels taste so good!

Prep: 10 mins

Cook: 2 mins

Serves 4

Ingredients

- 4 wholemeal bagels, sliced in half
- 80g low-fat soft cheese
- 40g ready-to-eat dried apricots, chopped
- 2 bananas, sliced

Method

- 1. Preheat the grill. Lightly toast the cut sides of each bagel.
- 2. Mix the low-fat soft cheese and apricots together and spread over the bagel bases. Top with sliced banana then sandwich the bagel tops in place.

If you cannot eat dairy, leave out the soft cheese. Mash the banana and spread over the toasted bagel, then sprinkle the chopped apricots on top.



Easter Flapjack

Ingredients

45g brown sugar

145g butter

60g golden syrup

215g rolled oats

200g milk or dark chocolate or a mixture of both

1 x 89g bag of mini creamfilled chocolate eggs or 1 x 80g bag of sugar-coated chocolate mini eggs

Equipment

Large pan

20cm² baking tin lined with non-stick baking parchment

Wooden spoon

Glass bowl

Small saucepan

Microwave (optional)

Method

- 1. Wash your hands and put on an apron.
- 2. Preheat the oven to 180°C, Gas Mark 4.
- 3. Melt the sugar, syrup and butter in a large pan until melted, bubbly and caramel in colour.
- Turn off the heat and add the oats, stirring well until everything is combined.
- Press the mixture firmly into the prepared baking tin and bake for 20-25 minutes until lightly golden on top.
- Remove from the oven and set aside to cool.
- 7. Meanwhile, melt the chocolate in a bowl over a small saucepan filled with simmering water. Alternatively, melt the chocolate by placing the bowl in the microwave for short 20-30 second bursts on a medium setting. Be careful, as chocolate burns easily if overheated.



Easter Flapjack

- 8. Spread the melted chocolate over the top of the cooled flapjack.
- 9. Decorate with whole sugar-coated eggs or cream-filled eggs sliced in half (this is easier to do if you have placed them in the fridge beforehand). Alternatively, open the bag of sugar-coated eggs slightly and bash with a rolling pin, then sprinkle the smashed-up eggs over the top of your flapjack.
- 10. When completely cool, remove from the tin and slice before serving.

To make the recipe vegan, simply replace the butter and chocolates with a vegan substitute.
