

Normalising Worries

It is important to be aware that your children's behaviour and emotions may have changed or may change in response to the current state of uncertainty as they try to adapt to their new situation. They are unlikely to be able to see all of the people who are important to them and they may be experiencing a feeling of loss.


At times of change, young people may regress to earlier behaviours, for example, wanting to sleep with the light on or wetting the bed. This is normal and it is important to try and be as patient as possible. Children and young people thrive on predictability and routine in their lives. If they have experienced significant change, they can often find change or the loss of a routine difficult to manage. You may well be seeing changes in your child's behaviour as a result of this. Some children may become clingy, tearful and easily distressed, others might become more challenging, demanding or be displaying tantrums. Fear and worry can show itself in many different ways; interrupted sleep, having nightmares, disrupted appetite and some children may regress in their skills. All of these are understandable and a normal response to worries.

One of the most important things we can do to support our children at this uncertain and ever changing time is contain their emotions by being steady for them — they take their lead from us. It is really important to answer their questions as honestly as you can at a level that won't increase their fear. It is fine to say, "I don't know the answer to that at the moment" if they ask a difficult question.

Children's fear rises more if they feel there is something we are hiding from them and this can lead them to imagine that what we are not saying is far worse than it actually is. It is also important we don't give them too much information. It can be helpful to have balance and focus on some of the more hopeful aspects such as recovery rates (92% of recorded

cases), the number of cases that are mild (93%).

'The Worrysaurus' reviewed by Miss Couch later on in this Newsletter and the ebook 'Everybody Worries' are both brilliant books to share with chidlren. 'Everybody Worries' is Jon Burgerman's brand new picture book designed to support children who may be feeling worried about Coronavirus and in particular the everyday changes to their lifestyle that it has brought about. With colourful characters and rhyming text, this original picture is designed to reassure young children that their worries are valid and also includes practical ways to help them to process and articulate their emotions.

Free School Meals

If your child is currently eligible for Free School Meals, we are committed to help you to access this provision. A Free School Meal is a statutory benefit available to school children of families who receive other qualifying benefits. If your situation has changed recently and to see if your child is eligible to receive free school meals please click on this link: Plymouth City Council Free School Meals. During the closure of our school we have made provision to ensure those in our school community who are eligible to receive free school meals continue to do so and have accessed the Government's FSM Voucher Scheme. These vouchers are allocated per family, based upon the number of children in the family who are of school age, and do not include Universal Infant Free School Meals, which all Reception, Year 1 and 2 families are eligible for. We are providing these vouchers for a number of reasons, in addition to all children who are eligible to Free School Meals (not Universal Infant Free School Meals), we have also provided vouchers to children who have had recent Social Care involvement, those who were previously eligible for Free School Meals, families who receive food hampers and have had a Foodbank voucher. If you need additional support as your circumstances have recently changed then please contact us and we will try our best to help you in any way that we can!


Year 6 Learning - Twentieth Century Conflict

Blocking In-App Purchases on Apple Devices

A major risk for Apps with In-App Purchases is users, particularly children, making In-App Purchases accidentally, or without the knowledge that they are making an In-App Purchase for real world money. To turn off the ability to make in-app purchases, you can follow these instructions on an Apple device such as an iPhone or iPad.

Step 1

Go into Settings > Screen Time > Content and Privacy Restrictions. Enter your passcode if asked.

Step 2

Tap iTunes & App Store Purchases.

Step 3

Choose a setting (for example, in-app purchases) and set to Don't allow.



Restricting Purchases on Android Devices

To restrict the ability to make in-app purchases on an Android device, you can follow the steps below:

Step 1

Open the Play Store and tap the 3-lines button in the top left.

Step 2

Select Settings > Require authentication for purchases > For all purchases through Google Play on this device.

This month, it would be fabulous if we could see some 'stargazers' which are on the list for Reception, Years 5 and 6 (although fun for any year group). Here are some top tips for stargazing:

1 Prepare

A clear and cloudless night is every Stargazer's dream but that can also mean it gets pretty chilly. Make sure you get cosy with warm blankets, hats, scarves and gloves. Torches are a great addition to help you get to your stargazing location safely.

TOP TIP: Red filtered torches provide light whilst not spoiling the view. If you haven't got a fancy one, using a rear red bike light or placing a red sock over a normal torch should do the job.

2. Pick the Right Time

A Crisp, Clear evening is the best time to go stargazing, so make sure you keep an eye on the weather reports.

TOP TIP: Waiting until 30-45 minutes after sunset before heading outside will increase your chances of seeing the stars.

3. Have Fun!

The most important thing about stargazing is to enjoy it. Whether you're tracking down Ursa Major the Great Bear or just getting warm and snuggly under the stars, let the night sky inspire you.



Sun Safety

We hope that you have been enjoying the sun in your gardens or when out on your daily exercise. CBeebies have shared some important some tips for keeping children safe. You can also use the link or QR code to watch a short song with your child. Please remember that if your child is returning to school or Nursery they will need to come with a hat and sunscreen already applied. Please also supply a named bottle of sunscreen so that they can top themselves up.

1. Stay in the shade when possible

It's a good idea to keep children in the shade in the middle of the day when the sun is at its strongest - try and get into the habit of heading indoors between 11am and 3pm, or use a parasol or a play tent to provide some shade.

2. Use a good sun cream

Make sure your child wears sunscreen that covers any exposed skin - use plenty, and don't forget their shoulders, the back of their neck, the tops of their ears, nose and cheeks and the tops of their feet. Choose a sunscreen that has an SPF of at least 30SPF and at least 4 stars for UVA protection. Make sure the sunscreen is not past its expiry date. Most sunscreens have a shelf life of 2 to 3 years.

3. Keep topping up the sun cream

Try and put sun cream on your child at least half an hour before heading out to play - remember that you'll need to put more on throughout the day, especially if they've been swimming or paddling.

4. Always pack a sunhat

It's a good idea for children to wear a floppy sunhat that protects their face and neck whenever they're out in the sun.

5. Drink lots of water

Give your child access to water throughout the day, especially in warm weather. Encourage them to drink regularly - particularly when they've been running around.



The team massively appreciate this but also are just doing their jobs and working exceptionally hard to ensure that the Marine Academy families are still looked after and provided with a high quality education throughout such a surreal time.

We have seen lots of budding scientists at home over the last couple of months and we have a new experiment for you to try; ice cream in a bag! This uses products that you may already have in your house!

Ingredients

- 1 cup of full fat milk or double cream
- 1.5 tsp vanilla extract
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- ice
- 1/4 cup salt
- Ziploc bags 1 Small, 1 Large



Instructions

1. Pour 1 cup of half and half into a small Ziploc bag.



2. Add 1.5 teaspoons of vanilla extract and 1 tablespoon of sugar.



3. Seal the bag firmly and get any excess air out.



4. In the larger Ziploc bag, fill it about 1/2 way with ice. Add 1/4 cup of salt.



5. Then add your small bag and fill with extra ice on top. Seal the large bag.




6. Get gloves for shaking and shake for 6 minutes. *Gloves are needed since the salt makes the ice extra cold - do not let this touch your skin.



- 7. Take the small bag out of the large bag and rinse the outside of the small bag with cold water. Make sure to rinse out the top part of the bag also (above the seal).
- 8. Once done rinsing, carefully open the small bag to not get any remaining salt from the outside of the bag inside the bag.
 - 9. The ice cream will be a little icy looking to start. Use a spoon to mix it around and soften it up a bit. Scoop out and enjoy!
