Wew this Month

Year 6 – Year 6 have had a great term and have been incredibly enthusiastic about their learning. Both classes showcased their knowledge by producing awesome History essays for the topic 'Industrial Revolution'. Their Maths skills have been put to the test this term, but Year 6 have proven that they are super learners. In English, the children have displayed their writing techniques in their own newspaper articles, which were all well written and presented. The children have enjoyed working with different art resources to create their own 'L.S. Lowry' inspired pictures. We have fabulous topics next term including the Geography based topic 'Local Fieldwork' and 'Classifying Critters' for Science, which will provide some brilliant learning opportunities.

Year 4 - What a fantastic term the Year 4 children have had! They have worked hard across the entire curriculum and have immersed themselves into their learning each day. The children really enjoyed their topic 'Roman Britain' and wrote some fantastic end of unit essays which were factual, clear and concise. It was evident the children learnt a great deal about how the Romans changed Britain forever and gave their own opinions about how these factors have changed their life today. In English, the children learnt all about the book 'Wonderful Women who changed the World' which highlighted women throughout history who individually changed the World through their aspirations and intellect. The children then researched their chosen person who they believe changed history to create their own piece of writing based around this person. In maths, the children have developed their knowledge on adding and subtracting 4-digit numbers. It proved to be tricky but through perseverance, the children developed a great understanding.

What a fantastic month of learning Year 4!

Reception – What an amazing first term in Reception! The Reception team couldn't be prouder of how well they've engaged with all aspects of school, shown super enthusiasm and shown a willingness to learn. The children are so excited to learn new phonemes during their Phonics lessons and are now applying this to their reading and writing. It has been lovely to see the children create new friendships, want to please their teachers and even take on the role of a teacher during Independent Learning time! Our topic this term has been 'Superhero Me!' The children have discussed similarities and different between their features, talked about what they are good at and what they would like to be better at, as well exploring special events in their lives. After lots of practise, the children can now retell the story of 'A Hug for Humphrey' using their Makaton what superstars! We wish you a super half term and we can't wait for what Term 2 has

Year 1 – Mrs Marchant and Mr Andrews are very impressed with how quickly Year 1 have settled into their new learning environments. Within Maths, the children have focussed on understanding how to count forwards and backwards using numbers to 20. They are developing a better understanding of how to use a range of resources, to count, partition and build numbers. In Guided Reading, we have enjoyed exploring the class text. We are beginning to use adjectives to describe a character or setting as well as building on our already awesome comprehensive skills. In Science, Year 1 have looked closer into the Polar Regions, what they may find there, how it compares to our environment and particular influential explorers that have travelled there. Year 1 already have a fantastic attitude to their learning, and we hope this continues as the term goes on. A fantastic start Year 1, well done!

Year 3 – This month, Year 3 have continued their fantastic start to life in Key Stage 2. In English, the children have explored the importance of letters and have innovated their own letters whilst reading 'Dr K Fisher'. In Maths, the children have compared different values through learning about the place value of three-digit numbers, and then order three-digit numbers from ascending or descending order. At the end of the term, Year 3 completed their Topic learning of Prehistoric Britain by visiting Kents Cavern,

Year 2 - All the Year 2 team are impressed by how well the children have adjusted into the increased expectations and independence required in Year 2. In Art this term, the children have designed then created their own printed wallpaper pattern based on Victorian styles. In Maths, the children have been learning more about adding and subtracting 2-digit numbers including using written methods like the column method. In English, we explored the questions, description and observation used in the book The Train Ride to write our own non-fiction texts about our hunt for Wilma the dog around school. History in October has seen us learning about 2 sets of important historical figures (Queen Victoria and Queen Elizabeth I then Mary Seacole and Florence Nightingale). The children deserve a good break for all their hard work. We are looking forward to a happy, busy and successful time

next term.

Year 5 - The children have had a successful first term of Year 5 and it has been lovely to see their enthusiasm and talent shine across the curriculum. This month, they have produced Covid coping guides within their non-fiction unit in English. The quality of these was truly magnificent and many children were awarded new personal bests thereafter. In Maths, Year 5 have developed their confidence with using formal written methods for addition and subtraction before applying these to solve word problems. After that, they completed a statistics unit, where they interpreted data shown in a range of graphs and tables. Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone has captured the children's imaginations in Guided Reading. During recent weeks, they have compared the personalities and actions of the main characters, expanded their vocabulary and finished the term by writing a detailed book review and watching the film. Other highlights during October include the great Benin clay tiles produced, confident sharing of acquired knowledge about the Benin Kingdom in History and super Science learning completed, in relation to the Solar System and specifically the orbits of the Moon and Earth. A terrific October - well done Year 5!

Pre-School – The children in Pre-School have had a fantastic end to the term, the children were amazed to find that the teddy bears had all gone missing! The bears even made a video for all the children. This has helped the children to become even more excited for our new topic "Where's my Teddy?" The children have all been doing fantastic learning all term, we have learnt about different emotions the children might feel, we have discussed and shown our friends items that are special to one another and we have discussed our daily morning routine! All the adults are very proud of them!

<u>Nursery</u> – This term the children in Turtle class have loved learning about their topic, Incy Wincy Spider. The children were amazing at learning the song as well as a new song, 5 Hairy Spiders. As part of the topic, the children have enjoyed exploring the spiders in the oats, creating our very own spiders out of playdough and painting spiders using toilet roll tubes. The children have had so much fun and can't wait to begin their new topic!

The city's remembrance service will take place on Plymouth Hoe on Sunday 14th November 2021. The service will commence with a two-minute silence at the Royal Naval Memorial at 11am. The Lord Mayor, Councillor Terri Beer, and the Lord Mayor's Consort, Mr Colin Beer, will be joined by the Deputy Lieutenant of Devon for this year's Remembrance Service on Plymouth Hoe. Members of the public and local organisations will be invited to pay their respects and lay their personal wreaths at the end of the service, on the north side of the memorial, following the departure of the civic dignitaries.





TikTok introduces Family Pairing





With families in mind TikTok have taken a number of steps over the past year to improve and enhance their policies, controls, and educational resources. They have <u>made their policies more transparent and accessible</u>, grown their trust and safety teams, built upon the resources in their <u>Safety Center</u>, and partnered with leading online safety organisations including the <u>Family Online Safety</u>

Institute, ConnectSafely, National Center for Missing and Exploited Children, and the PTA.

Please remember though that children should not begin their creator journey on TikTok until they are 13 years old. At this point, they are introduced to a wider array of app options for download, making it a critical time for teens and their families to learn about digital literacy and smart online behaviour. In addition to Family Pairing, TikTok already offers a number of resources to support users on this journey, including educational safety videos and parental guides like our Top Ten Tips for Parents.

They also encourage parents to talk with their teens about the code of conduct outlined in their <u>Community Guidelines</u> to help them understand what responsible community behaviour looks like, how to identify and <u>report</u> content that may be in violation, and what it means to be positive digital community members.

Family Pairing, which will be rolling out over the coming weeks, will allow a parent to link their TikTok account to their teen's and set controls.





Firework Safety

Despite annual safety warnings, firework celebrations still end in painful injuries for too many people, including very young children. Injury figures support the advice that the safest place to enjoy fireworks is at a large public display - far fewer people are injured here than at smaller family or private parties. But if you'll be having a firework party at home, you can make the occasion fun and safe for everyone by following the Firework Code, as well as some sparkler and bonfire safety tips.



Firework Code

Only adults should deal with setting up firework displays, the lighting of fireworks and the safe disposal of fireworks once they have been used (and remember, alcohol and fireworks don't mix!). Children and young people should be supervised, and watch and enjoy fireworks at a safe distance. Follow these top 10 tips for a safer fireworks party:

- 1. Plan your firework display to make it safe and enjoyable, and check the time you can legally set off fireworks
- 2. Only buy fireworks which carry the CE or UKCA marks, keep them in a closed box, and use them one at a time
 - 3. Read and follow the instructions on each firework using a torch if necessary
 - 4. Light the firework at arm's length with a taper and stand well back
 - 5. Keep naked flames, including cigarettes, away from fireworks
 - 6. Never return to a firework once it has been lit
 - 7. Don't put fireworks in pockets and never throw them
 - 8. Direct any rocket fireworks well away from spectators
 - 9. Never use paraffin or petrol on a bonfire
 - 10. Make sure that the fire is out and surroundings are made safe before leaving.

Sparkler Safety

Sparklers are often viewed as being harmless but they burn at fierce temperatures, equivalent to a welding torch. Follow these top tips for sparkler safety:

It is recommended that sparklers are not given to under-5s

- 1. Make sure everyone handling sparklers wears gloves
- 2. Hold sparklers at arm's length while being lit and light them one at a time
 - 3. Don't wave sparklers about close to other people
 - 4. Never hold a baby in your arms while you are holding a sparkler
 - 5. When the sparkler has finished put it in a bucket of cold water.
















