Fieldwork, fundraising and fantastic Phonics!

Pre-School

March has been a busy and an exciting month for the Pre-School children, filled with lots of fun activities. Firstly, the children have loved their topic 'What Can I Build?' where the children have been busy constructing and building rockets, houses and even making some shoes. Secondly, the children loved taking part in World Book Day, Red Nose Day and being on their scooters and their bikes for the Big Walk and Wheel programme.

In P.E, the children have been practising their balancing skills and in Phonics we are continuing to listen to the first sound in words. The children are looking forward to their new topic after the Easter break, 'What Can I Cook?' where the children will be becoming little chefs and bakers.

Pre-School children and staff cannot wait for the new children joining Penguin and Puffin Classes. We hope you have a wonderful break and we look forward to seeing you again in April.







Reception

Reception have had a fantastic term full of exciting learning opportunities. The children have learnt about a range of texts including The Very Hungry Caterpillar, Tad and most recently Pip and Egg. The children have been so enthusiastic with all their learning this term but in particular they have been so enthused at watching our caterpillars change into butterflies. They have also been very excited to see their seeds grow!

During Phonics, we have continued our brilliant learning by reading long words such as fantastic and lightning! During Maths, we have been learning all about 2D and 3D shapes, learning about their various faces and the differences between 2D and 3D. We are so excited for next term and to start learning all about 'Marine Life.' What a super term!





Nursery

This term, Turtle class have been continuing with our topic 'Row, Row, Row Your Boat'. We have been exploring the boats in gloop, we have been on a crocodile hunt, we have created our own polar bears and we have brushed the crocodiles teeth to make them nice and shiny. The children have become really confident in learning the rhyme and they can use the Makaton well. We enjoyed exploring some Easter activities, such as, exploring the Easter sensory tray, making Easter cards and having egg hunts in the sand tray.

It has also been lovely to welcome some new friends on their Stay and Play sessions and we look forward to you starting with us in April! We hope that everyone has a fantastic Easter holidays.







Year 1

The children in Year 1 have had a busy month. They enjoyed taking part in World Book Day at the start of the month, collaborating with their friends from Reception and Year 2. The children undertook tasks relating to lots of different books and were able to talk about them in detail.

The children also enjoyed a variety of trips in March. During the first week, the children rode on the Ocean City Tour bus and took in the sights of Plymouth, identifying key landmarks as part of their Geography topic, 'To Plymouth and Beyond!" At the end of the month, the children visited Buckfast Abbey as part of their Religious Studies learning. At the Abbey, the children took part in an Easter workshop, where they made their own stained glass crosses. The children also had the opportunity to explore the Abbey and its grounds.

In school, the children completed lots of amazing learning. They undertook an invertebrate hunt in Science, learnt about Jesus and the 12 disciples in RE and built 3D houses in DT. We hope the children have a great Easter break. We look forward to seeing them in Term 5 for another term of learning.



Year 3

This month, the children in Year 3 have engaged brilliantly with their Geography topic "Villages, Towns and Cities". Earlier this month, the children conducted field work at St Budeaux Square and Calstock village to compare the two settlements. The children also travelled on an open-top bus to explore the different parts of Plymouth.

In Maths, the children have shown fantastic learning to compare different lengths and measurements. The children have solved real-life problems involving converting millimetres to centimetres, and centimetres to metres. More recently, the children have thought about fractions by finding equivalent fractions of one half and one quarter.

In Year 3, everyone had lots of fun taking part in World Book Day and Red Nose Day. We loved seeing everyone's costumes and the children helped to raise a fantastic sum of money for charity.





Year 2

What a brilliant month Year 2 have had! The children have really enjoyed exploring 'Rainforests' in their Geography topic this term. They have learnt some great vocabulary, that includes 'fauna', 'flora', 'humid' and 'global warming', which they have used independently in their end of unit essay. The children had a brilliant time exploring their local temperate rainforest on our trip to Kings Tamerton Woods too, where they explored a variety of fauna (animals) and flora (plants) on their trail. In English, we have explored the text, 'I don't like snakes' where the children have learnt a variety of facts about snakes. Using the skills, they have learnt in their English lessons, they were able to create their own information texts about spiders. In RE, the children have had two different guest speakers to speak about their religion of Islam and Judaism. The children were very respectful and learnt lots about their religions



Year 4

March has been another busy and productive month for Year 4! In Maths. children the have completed their fractions unit. In addition, we have continued to practise their times tables every day and we have seen super improvements in their recall. In English, the children enjoyed researching an endangered rainforest animal and subsequently created some excellent final writes which included a diary, status report and email imagining themselves to have been on an expedition.

Science this month, has led to some exciting experiments using electrical circuits. A particular favourite was the testing of conductors and insulators using different materials.

In DT, the children created some innovative torch housing, focusing on a particular purpose for a specific audience. They showed great resilience not to give up when things went wrong but to adapt and problem solve.

The highlight of this month was our Geography trip to Burrator where the children tested how the depth of the water affected the speed of the river. They also drew and labelled the river to highlight the erosion and deposition they saw. This led to the children producing some excellent essays on how rivers shape landforms and their importance to people.



Year 5

Year 5 have enjoyed a range of great experiences during March. A highlight has been their swimming lessons; it has been absolutely wonderful to see their skills progression and resilience. The children also had an enjoyable visit to Bellever Forest to complete some Geography fieldwork and expand their knowledge on the Temperate Deciduous Forest biome.

In English, we have studied the story 'The Ice Bear', where they have produced some innovative stories surrounding another animal from the Arctic. In Maths, they have been making excellent progress through their fractions topic, where they have been finding equivalent fractions, converting between improper and mixed formats, as well as adding and subtracting them. In Science, the children have enjoyed learning all about the different planets and the features they have! This was accompanied by some amazing home-learning, where the children have brought in their own facts and amazed the adults! Well done year 5!





Year 6

Year 6 have had a brilliant March, allowing them to be inspired on World Book Day, practise poetry on World Poetry Day, and help fundraise for Red Nose Day! In Maths, they have finished their topic of converting between Fractions, Decimals and Percentages.

In English, they have written a beautiful piece of writing, including suspense and tension. In Science, they have understood the impact of global warming and whose responsibility it is to make a change. In DT, they have understood the role of a fashion designer, creating their very own waistcoat, which we are hoping can be displayed in their end-of-year assembly. In Geography, they have researched the importance of understanding a country's population. Even after all of this, the children continued to show excellent resilience and determination during their mock SATS papers this week, and we couldn't be prouder! Very well done, Year 6!

Our Reception and Pre-School children had an informative and interesting assembly this month all about how to look after their teeth and to ensure they have great oral health. REMINDERS

 and shoes to wear.




Attendance Matters

LATENESS IN SCHOOL



Every minute in school is very important; at Marine Academy Primary School learning starts during Early Morning Learning at 8:30am!

Children arriving late in school are often anxious about what they have missed and this may lead to them not wanting to come to school. The school day starts at 8.55am. We need your child to be in class by then; arriving after this will result in a late mark. Children arriving after 9:30am will receive a U mark; this means that the morning will be unauthorised.



If getting your child to school on time is a struggle, please tell us, we are here to listen and help!

How can you help?

- Make sure your child gets a good night's sleep
- Help your child with homework and reading so they aren't worried about being 'in trouble' at school
- Make sure that uniform and school bags are ready the night before and encourage your child to take responsibility for this as they get older
- Set off in plenty of time to get to school in time
- Breakfast is important either at home or at Breakfast Club
- Let the school know if your child is worried about anything that might stop them wanting to come to school
- Be positive about school even if your own experience wasn't great and where
 possible, get involved with school activities and events. We have a really great PTA
 (FaTMAP) who would welcome more parents and carers joining!

Hot Cross Buns

Ingredients

flour

50g caster sugar 50g butter, cubed

200g dried mixed fruit 7g sachet of easy-blend, dried yeast

200ml milk

2 eggs

2 heaped tsp mixed spice

 $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp salt

To decorate

3 tbsp plain flour

2 tbsp water

Honey or golden syrup

Equipment

Oven

2 mixing bowls

Measuring jug

Fork or whisk for beating

Blunt knife

Baking sheet

Cling film

Piping bag

Pastry brush

Method

- 500g strong, white bread 1. Mix the bread flour, salt, mixed spice and sugar.
 - 2. Rub in the butter using your fingertips and stir in the dried fruit.
 - 3. Sprinkle the yeast over the mix and stir.
 - 4. Carefully, warm the milk and beat this with the eggs. Then, add the dry ingredients.
 - 5. Mix the ingredients until they form a moist dough and leave for 5 minutes.
 - 6. Remove the dough from the bowl and cut it into 8 equal pieces.
 - 7. Shape each piece into a bun and place on a floured surface. Then, place them on a baking sheet. Cover them loosely with cling film and leave in a warm place until they have grown about 50% bigger (anywhere between 45 minutes and $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours).
 - 8. When they have risen, mix the flour with the water until it forms a paste. This will be make the cross decoration on top.
 - 9. Put the paste into a piping bag. Pipe crosses on top of each bun.
 - 10. Bake for 12–15 minutes until golden. Brush the honey or golden syrup over the top.
 - 11. Enjoy warm or toasted with butter!

Makes approx. 8 hot cross buns.



FIVE NIGHTS AT FREDDY'S

Please see the guide on the next page about Five Nights at Freddy's, which we are aware has been played by some children in school. The content has some horror themes and disturbing/violent content so we would like to discourage the children from interacting with the games.

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

PEGI

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? Five Nights at Freddy's is a series of indie point-and-click horror games whose word-of-mouth success and widespread spin-off content on YouTube have helped each of the nine instalments so far to sell almost five million copies on Steam (the PC gaming platform) alone. Set in various deserted locations at night, with creepy animatronic characters suddenly coming to life, the games are rated PEGI 12 for

disturbing/violent content, mild profanity and horror themes. FRIGHTENING THEMES

Five Nights at Freddy's (FNaF for short) doesn't feature bloodshed like many horror games – but it does build tension and use jump scares, which may be too intense for young players. The sinister animatronic characters and the sensation of being trapped and defenceless could be particularly unsettling, as could the inclusion of disturbing elements such as murder or possession by



AGE-INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

As a result of FNaF's popularity, a sizeable YouTube community based on fan-made content has developed around the game. While the majority of this material is still child friendly, there are a number of channels which are geared more towards mature audiences: they contain adult and disturbing themes, for example, and (in some cases) age-inappropriate language.

STRESSFUL SITUATIONS

Due to FNaF's suspenseful atmosphere, it can be extremely stressful for players. Constantly checking that one's surroundings are safe is a crucial part of the gameplay and could create residual stress or even obsessive-compulsive behaviours. Several media reports have suggested that some younger children have experienced severe nightmares or sleep anxiety after pläying games from the series.

IN-GAME SPENDING

FNaF doesn't foreground in-game purchasing as strongly as many other well-known games, but some titles in the series do offer additional content that promises to enhance the experience. Five Nights at Freddy's: Help Wanted, for instance, is complemented by a Halloween-themed expansion pack called 'Curse of Dreadbear' (costing £8.99), which unlocks new levels and mini-games.



PLAYING IN ISOLATION

Many parents will be relieved to learn that Five Nights at Freddy's is a single-player game which doesn't include any online chat functionality. Conversely, however, this could also make playing FNaF quite an isolating experience – especially if your child is spending a lot of time investigating the game's spooky, shadowy environments alone in their room, for example.

Advice for Parents & Carers

USE PARENTAL CONTROLS

Five Nights at Freddy's doesn't have conventional parental controls. However, if you're concerned about the potential impacts of the game's themes and content, you can simply choose not to let your child play it. If they use an Android or iOS device for gaming, you can adjust Apple and Google's built-in parental controls to restrict your child's access to certain content.

TRY IT YOURSELF

Every child is different, of course, so it could be worth playing Five Nights at Freddy's yourself for a while to gauge how your young gamer might cope with the series' more frightening and disturbing aspects. If they're old enough, you could spend some time playing it together – after all, it usually only takes between two and ten minutes to complete a level.

LIMIT SPENDING

Unlike many popular titles, Five Night's at Freddy's doesn't bombard players with tempting in-game purchase offers. It's worth noting, however, that some instalments in the series do provide the option for players to spend real-world money. With that in mind, it's important to either keep a close eye on your child's expenditure or limit their access tó digitál payment options.

SPOT THE SIGNS

If you're concerned that your child might be spending too much time on Five Night's at Freddy's, or you're worried that the game's scary themes are taking a toll, watch out for warning signs. Young people may start to prioritise gaming over everyday essentials like schoolwork or sleep; irritability or a lack of concentration could also indicate that their gaming sessions are going on too long.

TALK ABOUT THE RISKS

Before you allow your child to play Five Nights at Freddy it's wise to have a conversation about the game so that they're aware of the potential risks. Ensure that your child understands that the series is purposely designed to be tense and unsettling, and that they should stop or take a break if the intensity of the gameplay is making them feel uncomfortable or putting them on edge.

Understanding PEGI Age Ratings



PEGI ratings offer a traffic light system of age ratings for computer games. The purpose of the age ratings is not to show how difficult a game is but to indicate that the games are appropriate for players of a certain age.



The age ratings for green PEGI 3 and PEGI 7 games are advisory. The age ratings for the orange PEGI 12 and PEGI 16, as well as the red PEGI 18, are legally enforceable. This means that shops cannot sell or hire games with an orange or red rating to people who are not the right age. Online and downloaded games are not technically included but many major providers voluntarily add the limits to their games.

PEGI 3

Suitable for all age groups. These games should not include any sounds or pictures which will frighten young children. There should be no bad language. Mild forms of violence can only be used in a comical or childlike setting.

7 PEGI 7 Games may contain scenes or sounds that could frighten young children. They can also contain mild forms of violence but this must not look realistic and must not be too detailed.

12 PEGI 12 Games may show violence in a slightly more graphic way towards fantasy characters. Violence towards human-like characters is still unrealistic. There may be gambling and suggestive activities or language included. Bad language must be mild.

16
PEGI 16

Games can feature more realistic violence. Games may include tobacco, alcohol or illegal drugs and stronger bad language.

18 PEGI 18



The stories on this list have been specially selected by the experts at BooksForTopics to cover the topics of grief and loss as well as stories about finding ways to remember beloved friends or relatives after they die. These topics are not always easy to discuss with children, but the stories selected on this list are included because they can provide a suitable stimulus for exploring experiences of bereavement, grief and loss.

When I'm Gone: A Picture Book About Grief

Written sensitively and illustrated beautifully, this book gently takes the reader (a child of any age) by the hand and helps them understand that when someone leaves us, that person didn't choose to do so and a part of them will always live on in the memories and love that they shared. The book gently encourages readers that it is okay to feel different emotions and for those emotions to be displayed in different ways. Written with the support of Child Bereavement UK, with useful tips at the back of the book for supporting a child (or grown-up) going through the bereavement process. Death is often difficult for us to talk about, but this book will hopefully pave the way for those necessary conversations to happen.

ASK FOR ANI



What is Ask for ANI?

Ask for ANI (Action Needed Immediately) is a codeword scheme that provides a safe, discreet and confidential way for victims of domestic abuse to access help from their local pharmacy or jobcentre.

What are Safe Spaces?

Ask for ANI is delivered in partnership with Safe Spaces, a safe and confidential room where victims can take some time to reflect, access information on specialist support services, or call friends or family.

To get help, follow these three simple steps:



Step 1:

Use our postcode checker on **gov.uk/ask-for-ani** to find your nearest participating pharmacy or jobcentre.

Step 2:

Go to the location, approach a member of staff and ask for ANI or ask to use a Safe Space ("Please can I speak to ANI?" or "Can I use a Safe Space please?").

Step 3:

You will be taken to a private space where a trained member of staff will provide support and you can decide what to do next.


