PE and Sport Premium for Primary Schools: Where the Funding is spent...

Project: Motivational Speaker – Team GB Bobsleigh Athlete

Cost: £250

Aim: to encourage children to develop a healthy lifestyle.

Outcome: a motivational speaker will speak to the whole school in assembly about their successes and aspirations as an athlete but also the importance of working hard at school. The children will then complete a two hour workshop which will provide them with the necessary skills to develop a healthy lifestyle.

Project: CPD for PE Teachers

Cost: £500

Aim: to develop specialist PE knowledge across the team.

Outcome: two members of staff will attend CPD for PE and will develop their specialist knowledge of the subject. This will then allow for them to provide INSET training to the rest of the team to ensure that teachers are confident and have a good knowledge of PE when delivering the subject.

Project: Physical Development Training for Reception teachers and support staff

Cost: £250

Aim: to continue to develop the provision for Physical Development throughout the Reception unit.

Outcome: staff will become more confident when planning for and delivering Physical Development activities and as a result, children will make outstanding progress in this Prime Area of learning.



Project: Extra-Curricular Sports Clubs

Cost: £900

Aim: to broaden PE resources across the Academy.

Outcome: staff members will identify 'non-participants' in extra-curricular sport and provide additional activities to encourage their immediate and longer-term participation in sport and physical activity.

Project: More Able Sports Initiative

Cost: £450

Aim: to monitor and support teachers to run extra-curricular activities which are aimed at the more able pupils.

Outcome: the impact of PE teaching will be monitored to ensure a lasting legacy. Activities specifically aimed at enabling the most able pupils to achieve high standards in PE and sport are introduced.

Project: PE Resources

Cost: £3000

Aim: to broaden PE resources across the Academy.

Outcome: a broader range of PE resources are available to re-energise school sport, with a focus on competition and creating a sporting habit for life for our pupils.

Project: Sports Coaching

Cost: £3200

Aim: extend experiences and build confidence.

Outcome: one morning per week a specialist PE teacher provides CPD for our PE coordinator and their class through the delivery of a variety of sports. The children will also benefit from an increased participation in inter-school competitions from across our Academic Council. The specialist PE teacher will also provide support with our Silver Kitemark application.

PE and Sport Premium Statement

Schools receive PE and Sport Premium funding based on the number of pupils in Years 1 to 6. In most cases, the amount received is determined by how many pupils at the Academy attract the funding using data from the January 2014 school census.

Schools must spend the funding to improve the quality of the PE and sport activities they offer their pupils but they are free to choose the best way of using the money.


For example, you can use your funding to:

- ★ hire specialist PE teachers
- ★ hire qualified sports coaches to work with teachers
- ★ provide existing staff with teaching resources to help them teach PE and sport
- ★ support and involve the least active children by running or extending school sports clubs, holiday clubs and Change4Life clubs
- ★ run sport competitions or increase pupils' participation in the School Games
- ★ run sports activities with other schools.

For the academic year 2014-2015, the initial PE and Sport Premium allocation to Marine Academy Primary is:

- ★ Throughout the academic year 2013-2014, rates of progress from below average starting points are extremely strong in all areas of learning. Given that almost half the cohort is summer born the result is even more significant.
- ★ In September, 22.2% of children entered broadly working within the 22-36 months Development Matters band and 77.8% of children working within the 30-50 months Development Matters band. 0% of children were working within 30-50 months with aspects of 40-60+ months. This represented that no children were achieving the expected on entry score for their age.
- ★ 66.7% (18 children) achieved a Good Level of Development which is approximately 9% above Plymouth's average. 33.3% (9 children) did not achieve a Good Level of Development and this was significantly due to Reading and Writing strands of learning. However, 18.5% did exceed in these areas. Interventions will be planned to support the pivotal children next year.

Summary of PE and Sport Premium Funding to Date

Objectives in Spending PE and Sport Premium Funding

The aims of the Academy are to continue to raise standards and aspirations in Physical Education and to further widen the access of a range of different sports, dance and gymnastic activities. Throughout the year children will receive some specialist sports teaching within their PE lessons and have access to a wide range of daily sporting clubs during extra-curricular activities. We seek to improve the competitive skills of groups and individuals through competitive sports days as well as taking part in a wider range of competitions and events across the city of Plymouth and our Academic Council. All of our children are divided into four houses which adds a competitive element to their PE sessions and a sense of camaraderie and team working.

Less able and reluctant pupils are encouraged to join in extra-curricular activities and may be asked to support some of the younger children attending the club.

We aim to promote the physical wellbeing of our pupils whilst developing core skills to use across the curriculum, including leadership, resilience, teamwork and collaboration.

Outcomes to Date

- ★ All extra-curricular activities are oversubscribed, with over 50% of the Academy's population taking part in a sporting club after school.
- ★ A wide variety of PE and sport are taught on a daily basis and the New National Curriculum has been used to inform this teaching.

- ★ There are increased opportunities for competitive sport, including inter-house competitions, sports day and external opportunities through our Academic Council.
- ★ Children in Reception receive specialist PE teaching each week to further develop their Physical Development skills, which are below average on entry.
