

YEAR GROUP NEWS

New year, new term, new topics!

Reception

Reception have had such a busy term! So far, we have had a mechanic fix Ms Wheelers car, had a train appear in class and we have even been on a train too! The children have shown a great willingness to learn this term. This has been best demonstrated in their brilliant Phonics learning in which we have learnt a range of new sounds, including, 'ur', 'ow' and 'ear'! (These can all be found on the Little Wandle Letters and Sounds website.)

We have engaged in a range of challenges, including, number ordering, drawing and labelling various vehicles and even creating maps! We are looking forward to next term and our new topic!





Pre-School

The Pre-School children have fully embraced our new topic, 'Who can help us?' Our little doctors have been busy in the surgery, chatting about the bones in their bodies and even brushing the Big Bad Wolf's teeth! We've also loved welcoming new friends into our class, and they've settled in so beautifully, picking up our routines in no time! The children preparing for school have been having a blast learning new sounds and spotting words that start with them. Meanwhile, the children staying with us have been enjoying listening to animal sounds and learning all about them.

In Maths, we've been exploring our three rules of counting and how they help us with our learning! The children have been practising their counting skills and understanding how important these rules are in solving problems and building strong foundations for future learning. We can't wait to see where this exciting topic takes us next!





Nursery

This term, Turtle Class have enjoyed their topic rhyme, 'The Wheels on the Bus'. The children have been using collage materials to create their own buses, they have used cars to roll in paint and create marks, and they have created their own passengers for the bus. Turtle Class have also been reading their topic book, 'The Whales on the Bus'. The children have enjoyed meeting the variety of different characters in the book and they have used paint to create their own snakes, hunted for dragons in the sand and used balls in paint to create their own hot air balloons. It has been lovely to welcome lots of new friends to our class and we can't wait to make so many memories together.





Year 1

Year 1 have had a fantastic start to the new year and new term! They have immersed themselves into their History learning, which is all about Ancient Egypt. They enjoyed exploring an Egyptian tomb and exploring different artefacts.

In English, we have enjoyed spotting the rhyming words in the hilarious story, 'Oi Frog!', and have had a go at our own rhymes. The children are doing so well at applying their Phonics learning in all of their other subjects when they are writing.

In Science, Year 1 have been studying their topic 'Holiday', and have been learning how to protect themselves from the sun, all about animal groups and the impact humans can have on different habitats.

We are excited to see what other amazing learning Year 1 can achieve next month!









Year 2

The Year 2 team are so proud of the progress made this term, especially in History and reading! In Maths, the children enjoyed learning about 2D and 3D shapes and are now exploring money. In English, we focused on 'Mixed Up Fairy Tales' by Hilary Robinson. The children's writing, creating their own mixed-up fairy tales, was outstanding!

They loved their visit from Samuel Pepys, which brought the Great Fire of London to life in an enriching way. The children have been highly engaged in learning about this event, and we've been impressed with their knowledge retention. Next week, they'll create news reports based on what they've learned. As always, the children have shown excellent manners, proving that Marine Academy Primary is full of superstars. Thank you for your continued support this year!





Year 3

The start of a new year and Year 3 have engaged excellently with all of their new topics. Firstly, the children have enjoyed exploring the Shang Dynasty in China, learning all about ancient civilisations and how the Shang Dynasty started. The children have made fantastic links to their previous History topic of Prehistoric Britain to do this.

In Science, we have been investigators of light sources and how light is able to reflect from different surfaces. So far, the children have explored different surfaces and materials within the classroom and made predictions about whether light would reflect or not. We experimented using a laser to refract the light against mirrors to bend the light in different directions. In Maths, the children have used their times table knowledge to calculate multiplication and division problems. In Art, the children made their own papyrus paper using grease-proof paper and PVA glue. Lastly, in SMSC, the children enjoyed learning about real and fake news. The children looked at many different news articles and had to decide whether they thought the article was either real or fake.





Year 4

This month, Year 4 have embraced their learning and made amazing progress in all their topics! In History, they have gained an insight into where the Anglo-Saxons came from, how they lived and their social hierarchies including how they were ruled. The children enhanced their knowledge by increasing their local history facts and making links to their previous Geography learning.

In English, the children have researched and written biography about inspirational people, following on from studying their text 'Fantastically Great Women Who Changed The World'. In Maths, Year 4 have completed their Multiplication and Division unit, where they progressed to multiplying and dividing a 3-digit number by a 1-digit number and have commenced their Fractions unit.

In RE, they have been learning about how followers of Islam follow the Quran, what prayer means to them and how they pray. This knowledge has been boosted by the daily reading of 'Planet Omar' in Whole Class Reading. The children have enjoyed their Science topic 'States of Matter' and are now able to identify the particles and properties of solids, liquids and gases. Well done to all Year 4 children for their dedication, making this another successful month!





Year 5

A truly exceptional start to 2025! In Year 5, students have developed key skills across various subjects. In Maths, they focused on multiplication and division, building fluency in solving problems using different strategies, including long multiplication and short division. In English, they enhanced their writing by using figurative language, such as similes, metaphors, and personification, to create vivid descriptions and engaging narratives. To support their History learning, students gained a deeper understanding of the Normans through an exciting real-life visitor who brought the past to life, helping them explore the impact of the Norman Conquest in an interactive and immersive way. Well done for a super start to Term 3!





Year 6

Year 6 have had a wonderful start to 2025. In Art, we have been focusing on understanding abstract art, and have started to create our own piece using graffiti based on something we care deeply about. In Maths, we have completed a module on Ratio and have begun learning Algebra with introducing 'variables'.

Our class book, 'Journey to Jo'burg', has also been really interesting and we have been learning about two siblings who are going on a journey through South Africa. This has also coincided with our History topic, 'Civil Rights'. The children have explored this topic with such passion and have given detailed and mature responses. Once again, it has been a fantastic start to the year and as a Year 6 team, we are really excited to keep this up!



ONLINE SAFETY

At the start of a new year, supporting the children to have positive online experiences and to use technology responsibly remains hugely important. With the cold, dark evenings and following the Christmas break, this is a period when device use can take up a large amount of spare time. Here are some further tips to help reassure, advise and educate your child about this topic.

TECHOSAURUS

Talking about online safety can seem daunting, but it doesn't have to be. Techosaurus has been created by the NSPCC specifically to make these conversations as easy as possible for you and your child.

Techosaurus is aimed at young children who are starting to use technology and the internet, and keeps the conversation around online safety positive.

Techosaurus will help your child to form healthy online habits, routines and behaviours from a young age, and build basic knowledge and skills related to online safety.

For a **donation of £3**, your child can be introduced to the online world safely through Techosaurus.



What is it?

Zoomerang is one of the most popular apps right now. It is a simple video creator that allows you to capture short videos, apply filters, and add special effects and background music. You can then share these videos on social media. It is most popular for helping people create videos for Instagram and TikTok. Zoomerang is known for its simplified tutorials which make video creating and editing accessible to almost everyone, including younger kids with access to a child's iPhone or any mobile device.

What are the dangers?

One of the features that can be a cause for concern with is location tracking. This can allow strangers to see where your child is located when using the app.




E-Safety lessons



At the beginning of every half term, children across the Academy participate in discrete e-safety lessons which are taught in addition to their Computing lessons. This term, Year 1 have compared activities that use the internet and those that don't. Year 2 have explored safe searching, whilst Year 3 have studied ways of assessing the reliability of websites. Year 4 have discovered how online content can spread and found out about digital footprints. Year 5 have evaluated digital content such as blogs and blogs, whilst Year 6 have explored guidelines for using social media responsibly.

Please encourage your children to share what they have learnt with you and continue to highlight the importance of online safety.





What Parents & Educators Need to Know about



On messaging apps, social media and online games, group chats are among the most popular ways that young people engage with their peers online. Involving three or more individuals, these groups allow users to send messages, images and videos to everyone in one place. While they can be great for connecting with others, there are several risks posed by these tools.



BULLYING

Teens are often trying to find their place in their social group. Unfortunately, group chats can sometimes lend themselves to unkind comments being shared freely, putting people down to make their peers laugh – often creating a vicious circle that encourages others to join in. Being bullied so publicly – in front of friends and acquaintances – can also amplify the hurt, embarrassment and anxiety that the victim feels.

EXCLUSION AND ISOLATION

This common issue with group chats can happen in several ways: for instance, starting a new group, but deliberately excluding a certain child. Likewise, the chat may take place on an app which one person doesn't have access to, meaning they can't be involved. A child can also feel isolated when a group chat is used to discuss events that group chat is used to discuss events that exclude them – for example, sharing photos from a day out that they didn't attend.

INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

CENSORED Some discussions in group chats may include inappropriate words, swearing and unsuitable images or videos. These could be viewed by a child if they are part of that group, whether they actively engage in it or not. Some apps have features that cause messages to disappear after they're viewed, so children may be unable to report something they've seen, as it can only be viewed once or for a short time.

SHARING GROUP CONTENT

Group chats can feel more private and protected, allowing children to share inside jokes and video calls with a smaller group of jokes and video calls with a smaller group of friends. It's important to remember that while the chat's content is private between those in the group, individual users can easily share material with others outside of the group, or screenshot what's been posted. The risk of something a child intended as private becoming public is higher if there are strangers in the chat.

UNKNOWN MEMBERS

Within larger group chats, it's more likely for children to communicate with people they don't know. These strangers may be friends of the host, but not necessarily friendly towards everyone present. It's wise for young people to avoid sharing personal details and remember that they have no control over what others do with the material they send into the chat the material they send into the chat.

NOTIFICATIONS AND FOMO

A drawback of large group chats is the sheer number of notifications they tend to generate. Every time someone sends a message, each member's device will be 'pinged' with an alert. This could result in hundreds of notifications a day. This is often highly distracting, and young people's fear of missing out (FOMO) can cause increased screen time as they try to keep up with the conversation. they try to keep up with the conversation.



Advice for Parents & Carers

CONSIDER OTHERS' FEELINGS

Group chats can become an arena for young people to compete for social status. This could cause them to do or say things on impulse which could upset others. Help children consider how people might feel if they behave in this way. If the child does upset someone, encourage them to reach out, show empathy and apologise for their

PRACTISE SAFE SHARING

In any online communication, it's vital for young people to be aware of what they're sharing and who might potentially see it.
Ensure children understand the importance of not revealing identifiable details like their address, their school, or photos that they wouldn't like to be seen widely. Remind them that once something is shared in a group, they can't be certain where it might end up and how it might be used.

GIVE SUPPORT, NOT JUDGEMENT

Group chats are an excellent way for Group chats are an excellent way for children to connect and feel like they belong. However, remind them that they can confide in you if they feel bullied or excluded, instead of responding to the person who's upset them. Validate their feelings and empower them by discussing how they'd like to handle the situation. You can also encourage children to speak up if they witness others being picked on.

AVOID INVITING STRANGERS

Sadly, many individuals online hide thei identity to gain a child's trust and serve their own ends – for example, to gather information on them, to exchange inappropriate content or to coax them into doing things they aren't comfortable with. Ensure the child understands why they shouldn't add people they don't know to a group chat – and why they should never accept a group chat invitation from a stranger.

BLOCK, REPORT AND LEAVE

If a child is in a chat where inappropriate content is being shared, advise them to block whoever sent the material, report that person to the host app or platform and exit the group. If any of this content could put a minor at risk, contact the police. Emphasise that it's OK for children to simply lower and that it's OK for children to simply leave any group chat that makes them feel uncomfortable.

SILENCE NOTIFICATIONS

Having a device bombarded with notifications from a group chat can be an irritating distraction – especially if it's happening late in the evening.

Explain to children that they can still be part of the group chat while disabling notifications – and that it would be healthier for them to do so, avoiding a situation where they could feel pressured to respond.






